Individual Profile

Where were you born and where did you grow up?

I was born in Kogarah NSW on 27 January 1963 at St George Hospital. I grew up in Carlton about a 10-minute walk to Jubilee Oval, home of the Dragons. Eddie Lumsden, a brilliant winger for the Dragons, lived on the corner and Bluey Wilson, arguably one of the toughest players to ever lace up a boot, lived around the corner. His son Brad and I were best mates. What a childhood - I grew up surrounded by legends.

Where did you play your junior/local cricket or become interested in cricket?

I went to Sans Souci Public School and the school team evolved into Sans Souci Boys Cricket Club. Dad loved cricket, actually he loved all sports, and he had me sign up on the spot.

When and why did you become involved with UNSWCC?

It is believed I was the first professional cricketer in the Club's history. It was 1977 and I was 14 years old. Clayton Jones was a Master at my school, Newington College, and he was also my cricket coach at one point. He was captain of the UNSWCC third grade team, and they had a late drop out in third grade through illness and he asked would I like to field for them. Blick Oval vs Western Suburbs, 40-degree heat and no working fridge! I was paid \$5 and a can of lemonade.

What did you like about UNSW Cricket?

Everything! I had played Green Shield for Sydney and then for St George. I played a few lower grade games for Saints as well, but the environment was so different. Very strict, not much laughter. It was a case of seen but not heard. The UNSWCC was the exact opposite. Humour abounded and everyone from first grade to fifth grade was treated the same. Loved it. The place was just full of great blokes.

I'm loving the Old Boys network now as well.

What is your Club nickname (Explain who gave it to you and why – if not obvious Starky - have no idea why!

Robbo called me Thomas at one stage after Thomas the Tank Engine. He reckoned I just trundled in, over after over, like a steam train. I actually liked it, but it faded into obscurity when Greig retired.

The Table above outlines some of your Club achievements, roles, and honours. Can you give us an insight into how you saw your contribution to UNSW Cricket, which do you consider the most important?

I loved captaining and really enjoyed mentoring young cricketers coming up through the grades. I was never the best cricketer by a long shot, but I did have a bulldog mentality. I tried to instil that into the young blokes and that desire to never give up. In saying that I loved a laugh and I hope I made most days on the field enjoyable.

What did it mean to you to be awarded life membership?

The greatest honour ever bestowed upon me. Words cannot adequately describe what it means to me. This Club has been part of my life for over forty years and as a player for thirty years and to be recognised for my contribution still brings a tear to my eye. I love this Club and will till the day I die.

What is your greatest memory or memories of UNSW Cricket?

The 1995-96 fifth grade premiership - surreal still to this day. To captain that team was a privilege. I absolutely loved everyone in that team. The lifetime friendships I have made through the Club.

The first-grade team of the late 70S and early 80s. OMG. Ray, Livingstone, Robson, Chapman, Lawson, Dixon, Hanger, Perger, Pym, Handley, Tout, Jansson, Campbell, Grattan -Smith.

Can I be a bit self-indulgent and mention the following:

- Breaking the Club's bowling record and having the previous holder and my dear friend Greig Robinson present was very special.
- Player of the Year 2001-02 and 2002-03 aged 39 and 40 respectively!
- Match figures of 7-34 and 7-25 against Parramatta.
- Fourth grade hat-trick all LBW and it went wicket LBW then 30 minute rain delay - back on wicket LBW then 45 minute rain delay back on wicket LBW and hat-trick and you guessed it - off for another rain delay!

In what profession or area of work are/were you mainly involved? What are your main interests outside cricket?

I had 31 years in the NSW Police Force before I was medically discharged in December 2017. If it wasn't for my three shoulder reconstructions and this bloody insidious creature - PTSD, I would still be there. I loved every minute of it.

My interests now are my horses and upkeep of our property; a full time job.

Where are you now?

Living on 6 acres in Brandy Hill in the Hunter with the missus, our two youngest daughters, seven horses with one on the way, three dogs, a cat and my blue tongue lizard.
